Phonics



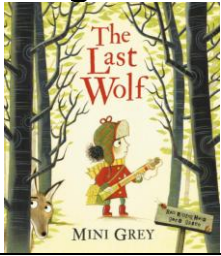
We are reviewing these graphemes and phonemes (GPC): **ea (e), ir (ur)**

Tricky word support

Tricky word	Why is it tricky?	How to teach <i>Say: This is the tricky bit.</i> Then ...
<u>any</u>	The grapheme 'a' makes the sound e . <i>This is a rare GPC.</i>	Point to 'a'. Say: This grapheme says e.
<u>many</u>	The grapheme 'a' makes the sound e . <i>This is a rare GPC.</i>	Point to 'a'. Say: This grapheme says e.
<u>two</u>	The grapheme 'wo' makes the sound oo (as in 'food'). <i>This is a rare GPC.</i>	Point to 'wo'. Say: This digraph says oo.
<u>who</u>	The word 'who' has two tricky parts: the digraph 'wh' makes the sound h and the grapheme 'o' makes the sound oo (as in 'food'). <i>These are rare GPCs.</i>	Point to 'wh'. Say: This digraph says h. Point to 'o'. Say: This grapheme says oo.
<u>whole</u>	The digraph 'wh' makes the sound h . <i>This is a rare GPC.</i>	Point to 'wh'. Say: This digraph says h.
